

Notes from Our Director

The Model A hobby is about developing friendships around a common interest.

Henry Ford designed and built a remarkable automobile which appeared at a time shortly after public interest in cars had reached its lowest point during the mid-1920s.

According to a recent article in The Smithsonian magazine, "By 1925, auto accidents accounted for two-thirds of the entire death toll in cities with populations over 25,000." One-third of all traffic deaths were children who played in the streets.

Car sales had decreased by 12 percent following years of upward growth due to an outcry over the slaughter of urban citizens by speeding cars. Car drivers forcibly claimed traditional pedestrian turf. It was thought by some people that the auto car fad had reached its peak and was in a state of rapid decline.

But the evolving interest in personal transportation brought mobility which was embraced by young Americans. Henry Ford recognized this trend, building on the success of his Ford Motor Company Model T. He designed a safer and more dependable car which had wide popular appeal.

The average person could quickly learn to repair his Model A while on the go, a tradition we hobbyists practice with each outing. Some involved repairs might require the perspective of a few experienced minds and the strength of many hands under the shade of a nearby tree. But most repairs can be effected with simple tools and common parts and accomplished by the enterprising individual. Such simple satisfactions are rare in an increasingly technological world built around micro-sized electronic circuitry.

So, the tradition continues. A Ford Barn website thread guesses that maybe 250,000 of the original 4.3 million Model A's built between 1927 and 1931 are still road worthy. An entire sector of American ingenuity, comprised mostly of 'Mom and Pop' businesses, supports our craving for these simple machines.

Let us associate with our own, waving and ahooga-ing as we go, spreading good cheer and camaraderie safely as we go.



The Story of Steve & Judy Mayer's Auburn 'A'

The car is a 1930 Ford Model A Standard Coupe. The car is owned by Steve & Judy Mayer from Marietta, GA. Although they are not Auburn graduates, their two daughters and two son-in-laws are Auburn graduates in addition to other relatives. When Steve wanted to restore the car, he thought that restoring it using Auburn colors would make it something that would be fun for the entire family and maybe even get Judy a little excited about being able to drive grandchildren around in the car on game day.

History of the Car

The car was originally purchased new by Steve's great uncle, Burch Cooke Chattin, on July 24, 1930 from Clyde Langford Motor Company in Atlanta, GA. Steve has the original Bill of Sale that shows Burch paid \$657 for the car. He made a \$237 down payment and financed \$420 over 12 months for \$35 per month. Burch sold the car to his nephew, George Mayer, in 1944. George drove the car back and forth from Decatur, GA to Jacksonville, FL where he was stationed at the US Naval Base prior to his deployment in World War II. After the war, George drove the car to classes at University of Georgia (Atlanta campus). After getting married and having five children, George had nowhere to keep the car and not much use for a two-seater, so in 1959 George and his six year old son, Steve, drove the car and parked it in Steve's grandmother's garage. That was the last time the car was cranked until 2014. George passed away in 1981 and Steve inherited the car. Concerned that his grandmother's garage was likely to fall down on the car, Steve towed the car to his house and stored it in the basement. Steve and Judy moved three times to different houses in the Atlanta area and each time the car was towed as part of the move and stored in the basement or garage.

Restoration of the Car

Finally in January 2014, Steve decided it was time to restore the car. He decided to have the car professionally restored rather than do it himself so that it could be completed quickly and enjoyed by the family sooner. The car was towed to Bentley's Antique Auto Service in Maysville, GA and a ground-up restoration began. In addition to Benny Bohanan and the good folks at Bentley's, during the restoration process Steve met many other nice people who helped with the restoration. Steve and Sue Mitchell of Mitchell Manufacturing provided the synchronized transmission/overdrive. The original Model A transmission is not synchronized and Steve wanted his children and grandchildren to one day be able to drive the car. Jim Donaldson and Kathy Kaiser of Knox Custom Chrome rechromed the car's original bumpers. Rather than buy new bumpers for the car, Steve wanted to use the original parts where possible and Knox Custom Chrome did a great job of re-chroming the original bumpers. There were the good folks at Coker Tire Company in Chattanooga, TN that supplied the original Model A tires as well as a terrific tour of their facility that is alone worth the trip there. There was Rich Fallucca of Antique Engine Rebuilding in Skokie, IL who rebuilt the original engine. There were many others who provided advice and tips including George and Jane

Merry, Wiley Higgins, Charlie Brown and Butch Morgan. One specific item Wiley inquired about was whether the serial number stamped on the motor matched the one on the frame. Being a novice, Steve did not even know the frames were stamped with a serial number. Wiley was excited to learn that the two serial numbers matched as he said this was very unusual to find a Model A where this was the case. The Model A was first cranked and driven by the restoration shop on Sept. 18th, 2014 and to Steve this seemed like a sign from above as that date was Steve's father's birthday. The restoration was completed in September 2014 and was first shared with Auburn fans at the Auburn/Texas A&M game the weekend of November 7th-8th, 2014.

Steve and Judy are excited about sharing the car with SEC football fans and look forward to many future Auburn home games. They also hope to be driving the car to GMR Club events starting in November 2014.




