

## Chattanooga Tour

The weather was a bit warm for late spring, but made to order for 29 Model A's on tour...cool at first, becoming hot and steamy as the day aged, enough so that the air conditioned rooms of the La Quinta Motel provided a welcomed refuge at the end of the first day's trek — a long 150 miles for the Southside A's and



an even longer 250 miles for many of the Central Alabama Club. One

disconnected exhaust pipe here, a dry carburetor there, an electrical fray and a few vapor locks provided minor distractions.

Following a short rest we headed off to **Harold Coker's** farm to view his private antique cars, housed in his magnificent mortise and tenon, 19<sup>th</sup> century era barn, the pride and joy of the collection being his prized stable of rare Thomas Flyer automobiles. The Edwin Ross Thomas Company of Buffalo, New York



manufactured only a few thousand cars during its existence from 1902 through 1911, and these magnificent, handcrafted automobiles had the reputation for being "the perfect" car due to their attention to detail in every aspect.

On Saturday our group paraded en masse to the town of Soddy-Daisy, the home of **Bud Ellis's** Horsin' Around Workshop, where planks of two-inch-thick basswood are glued together then carved to life as all

types of carousel animals. The wonder of these intricate transformations is their lacquered finished state representing a myriad of childhood memories to the awed Model A crowd.

Mr. Ellis gave us his undivided attention as he described the creative process from conception to completion and entertained us all with his stories of fact and trivia from the golden era of carousel design and construction from the late 1800s to the modern day revival of this nearly "lost" art form.

From there we split up around Chattanooga, with most of us finding our way to Coolidge Park to ride the Carousel or to the Knitting Mills Antique Mart,





both in the North Shore district of our host city. A leisurely afternoon of eating, strolling and shopping provided a nice respite from our cramped car interiors and gave us an opportunity to stretch ourselves out and upright.

Saturday evening found us gathered aboard the Southern Belle Riverboat where we enjoyed a sumptuous buffet, toe-tapping music and unexpected entertainment from a few members of our own traveling troupe of good-natured birthday celebrators and dancers. The highlight of the evening will forever be known as "The Kiss," when **Eugene and Kathleen Willingham** embraced on stage to commemorate their 57 years of marriage.



What a joy it was to be with a couple whose love is as vibrant today as it was in the summer of 1954. At the end of the boat ride we disembarked and found our way back to our beloved cars and then to our beds.

One blown head gasket resulted in a few hours of entertainment for a handful of the drivers but the joy of fellowshipping over a hot engine made for the light spirited camaraderie that binds the antique car hobbyists to one another. The joy came just before midnight in hearing the familiar sound of a well-tuned four cylinder engine come to life.

Familiar faces were seen. Old acquaintances were revisited. New friends were made. Its touring season – I hope you will join us as we travel the back roads of Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee.

We got back from Chattanooga with very few problems. Phil Meyers had a Vapor Lock, or it appeared to be, however she started right up and made it to the hotel. CAMAFC didn't fare as well. Had a muffler clamp that would not hold to the muffler; one car just died (ignition trouble), towed back to the hotel and then they had a head gasket blow; replaced gasket at the hotel then back on the road. My total mileage was 395 miles. Great trip if you did not have a break down (I think you could say that, even if you had a break down, as there was plenty of help to fix whatever went wrong).

I'm sure most of you know that Ray & Teri left on their summer tour to Alaska, with some friends from Marietta, Jim and Rose Donaldson. With the minor trouble we had on the Chattanooga trip, what may go wrong on a 10,000 mile trip? A head gasket, ignition trouble? Who knows what else!

Let's see, Ray has already blown a fuse in his car. Jim has overheated (had to remove the Thermostat) and his battery went bad (found one at NAPA in the next town) and they are back on the road. Jim also had a fan belt start to separate, replaced at the next stop. These items in the first 3,000 miles, or so.

Just read where Ray's Left front wheel bearing froze (welded by heat) to the Spindle. They had to cut, drill and file to get the new bearing on. They're back on the road.



# Model "A" Fashions

Model A meets often have women's clothing. Usually the first question ladies ask is "What size is it?" The standards for sizes have drastically changed over the years. In 1931, the smallest Sears Roebuck dress size was a bust size of 32, which was a size 14. When you ordered a dress, you sent in your bust and hip sizes, no waist measurement. It is suspected that the small bust size is due to restriction of undergarments. The corresponding hip size for a 32 bust size was 37 inches.


In 1930, if your bust size was 34, waist size, 24 and your hip size 37 inches, you were a size 16. Bottom line, if you are looking at vintage



clothing, you can't go by size. You must try it on!

The four sketches to the right show how much the fashions changed from the start of the Model A years to the end. Two of the biggest changes were longer hemlines and a natural waistline.

# Meet the Southside A's: Eugene & Kathleen Willingham



Venerable...reliable...thoughtful...loyal...well thought of...Christian...and last but not least...of good humor. These are the words that come to mind when speaking about Eugene and Kathleen Willingham. These lovely people were raised in Newnan, GA. Eugene was born in 1934, the son of a textile worker. Kathleen's father, Brown Payton, operated a 24/7 service station in Newnan, where he and his wife Nell both worked. Both fathers were WWII veterans.

During the depression, Eugene's family relocated to Carrolton, GA, for work in the mills, and later East Point, when his father entered the Army. During the Great War, they again relocated to the military base at Ft. Blanding, FL, where Eugene recalls firing a

machine gun during an open house. Eugene and his Mother returned to Newnan, once his Father went overseas. Eugene was an athletic young man, playing high school football until receiving an arm injury. He continued to play high school basketball and baseball and later excelled in golf, playing principally at his home course, Newnan CC where he was the club champion for several years and senior champion for more than a decade. His golf background began as a caddy at NCC where he worked with and studied the game under some of the top players at the country club and an including an amateur state champion. (The editor, also a golfer, would like to add the comment that winning one club championship in any category is quite a notable feat, let alone 15 or 20. That is beyond being good.) He was really a player!

Eugene and Kathleen were acquainted with each other since the 7th grade. After high school graduation and her first year at Mercer College, Kathleen returned for the summer to Newnan. Eugene reports he "...passed Kathleen's house every day on his way to work and one summer day was struck by a lightning bolt as he stared at Kathleen working in the yard." He quickly determined to ask his future bride out on a date. They were married the following year...1954. They have two children, Alan, a Georgia Highway patrolman, and Kay (Roberts), a school teacher now married to a local pediatrician.

After graduation from high school, Eugene was recommended by his high school councilor for a job with the fledgling William L. Bonnell Company, manufacturer of extruded aluminum parts. Mr. Bonnell soon became a second father figure. The company was so solid and grew so fast that Eugene discontinued his original desire to go to Georgia Tech and remained with the company for 46 years, having risen from draftsman to production control supervisor to plant manager before retiring at 65.

Eugene's and Kathleen's history with Model A's began early. Eugene recalls that his father was not mechanically inclined, but he does remember the family's black Model A Tudor. Kathleen, on the other hand, grew up with a 1929 Model A roadster as a part of her life from 9 years old to the present.

Brown Payton, Kathleen's father, had noticed the Roadster, which often stopped by his Service Station. After several offers to Mr. J.F. Parker were turned down, Mr. Payton purchased the car for \$450.00 in January of 1947.

Through the years, Mr. Payton received and declined many offers to sell the car, which reminded him of



his and wife Nell's car when they were married. At the time, the little roadster wasn't as sentimental to Kathleen as it came to be in later years, particularly when "Pops" would come to pick her up after school. "Yonder comes Daddy in that old car," was her embarrassed statement to her friends. Today, she bursts with

pride and her first words when seeing the car after the restoration was completed, were, "My Daddy is smiling in Heaven." Their son, Alan, also has memories of the old car, and would stand on the seat next to his grandfather, before he was two years old. After he began to talk, Alan called it "the baby car" and loved riding in it.

After Mr. Payton's death in 1980, the car remained in the family barn where it sat for 24 years, over painted in black to prevent further rusting. In Mama Payton's will, she left the Roadster to Kathleen in hopes that she and Eugene would "get it fixed." The "old car," was about to see a new life. After some attempts to make repairs, a complete body-off restoration was decided upon. On January 29, 2004, the car was hauled off and restoration begun.

Eugene and Kathleen often visited the shop during the one year's process. On their first visit, the car had been totally disassembled. "Where is my car?" asked Kathleen with a smile on her face. Jim smiled back and pointed to the frame standing against the wall, and the boxes and parts strewn all over the floor. The engine was confirmed as original (Sept. 1929) once they could see the number Ford had stamped on the frame. The final touch was the application of the orange pin stripe, which was done on the day it was delivered back home by trailer, July 18, 2005.

A few years later, the Willingham's added a beautiful 1930 maroon Victoria to their stable, which was recently featured in the epic movie about moonshining in the hills of Virginia during the 1930's, "The Wettest County in the World."



As of this article, both cars have been driven several thousand miles and are a credit to the Model A hobby. However, it is Brown Payton's beautiful little roadster that is the enduring pride of the family, a pride Kathleen hopes is nearly equal to her dear father's love of the car.


