


Jim Hunter at his ancestor's grave.

#### WARNING about LONG LIFE ANTIFREEZE

Antifreeze manufacturers have formulated their long life products and the inhibitor attacks, among other things, silicone compounds – the most commonly used base for gasket sealant.

It also attacks lead - based products (solder, Babbitt), some yellow metals (cam bearings, radiators) and conventional gaskets and packing materials. The warning here is to NOT use coolants with OAT inhibitors in your antique car! You need to read the label and use only IAT (Inorganic Additive Technology) inhibited antifreeze. OAT stands for 'Organic Acid Technology'- based corrosion-inhibitors, and they are designed to have longer service life than that of IAT coolants. Unfortunately, that feature comes with a bad side effect to older cars.

One fellow decided to change antifreeze in his antique car. His regular brand was out of stock so he bought the 'advanced' formula. For weeks later he found pools of antifreeze under his car. The antifreeze had dissolved the old gaskets. It was formulated with OAT inhibitors.

Here are some tips for finding IAT coolants:

- 1. Prestone says that all of their current antifreezes are OAT formulas.
- 2. Peak says that their antifreeze and coolant is an OAT formula. The container is blue. It is important that it NOT say 'long life.' Peak Sierra brand is propylene glycol, for those who prefer that. It, too, uses an IAT formula.
- 3. Zerex says that Zerex Original green is an IAT formula. It comes in a white container. Do not use their G-05 formula in the gold jug.

Editor note from Dave Tulowitzky: After reading the above article, I became concerned, as I had used the Prestone antifreeze in my '57 for the past few years. The Prestone bottle had the statement, "Prestone antifreeze coolant is intended for all passenger vehicles and light trucks." However, after a trip to the local Auto Parts Store, I noticed the Peak bottle had an explanation stating, "For use in Ford and Chrysler 2000 & earlier – GM 1995 & earlier – All MAKES & MODELS 1989 AND EARLIER."

I showed the above article to some auto technicians and some people behind the counter of a couple of Auto Parts stores. No one could give me an answer as to the truth in the article. I never had a problem with the Prestone: but just to be on the safe side, I drained the Prestone antifreeze and used the Peak instead. As always, it is your decision as to what to use in your car. TARTC Editor's note: I checked several brands of antifreeze that I have on hand. None of it

shows IAT or OAT as a formula or ingredient. I did however find that the Peak Long Life coolant included an ingredient called NJTSRN-QT1. After searching Google I found that this ingredient is a code name for a combination of organic acids – which may be the same as OAT - that was referred to in this article.

# MARC Meet in Lexington, KY June 24-28, 2013

The Southside A's were represented at the MARC National Meet in Lexington, KY by three couples, the Shotwells, the Millers and the Beschs. Officially it was a general Model A meet, but a better name might have been the A-400 Meet. Just joking, but there was a bit of truth to the thought; explanation to follow.

The Millers and Shotwells trailered their A-400s, while the Beschs drove their blue coupe, and we all converged on Sunday, June 23<sup>rd</sup> for the week-long series of planned events and self-guided tours. We were impressed by the organization of the meet by the Central Kentucky region, who created a comprehensive magazine that included not only the listing of events, registrants and their cars, but also multiple ideas for exploring the vast, gorgeous countryside of Lexington, which features indescribable horse farms, and the many distilleries on the "Bourbon Trail." We were given complete directions for these self-guided tours, along with suggestions for sight-seeing and marking Points of Interest. Fantastic.

With over 500 registrants, the variety of Model A's seemed endless. We were even treated to a display of homemade campers, some of which had made the journey to Alaska that inspired the Beschs to follow suit. Storm clouds played their part at several turns, having many of us frequently checking the weather radar on our smart phones. Despite the occasional dampening of a drive or two, everyone carried on, making the most of every opportunity to explore.

There were organized bus tours, including an all-day trip to Louisville, Churchill Downs (home of the Kentucky Derby) and the Little Slugger Museum, as well as trips to area distilleries and horse farms. Seminars on painting techniques, Model A Ad collecting, Fashions for A Day at the Races, and more, were well attended. Even the youngsters were kept busy with Hubley races and a pizza party.

The aforementioned A-400's were a featured part of the meet, with a seminar for owners and enthusiasts, and a spectacular display of 18 of these rare cars, the most ever gathered in one place since coming off the assembly line in 1931. Considering that there are approximately 125 road-worthy A-400's worldwide, we were very proud to have pulled together this many for the public to see. They arrived in Lexington from Massachusettes, California, Georgia, Michigan, and places in between. Following the wonderful Era Fashion Show and Ice Cream Social, the exhibit doors were opened to reveal the collection of Fine Point cars and A-400s. The guests were able to freely walk around each A-400, gaze in windows and ask questions of the owners. The Shotwells and Millers added to the festivities by arriving in their Era Fashions.





The next day brought the Grand Tour, with hundreds of Model A's driving the back roads on their way to the Kentucky Horse Park and Museum of the Horse. We had free rein (no pun intended!) of the facilities, and capped it off with a tasty meal inside the Altech Arena, the site of national and international equestrian events.

The Southside A-ers enjoyed side trips to the distilleries at Woodford Reserve and Wild Turkey (to sample their "medicinal" products), as well as visiting historic Shaker Village, and Keenland Race Track.


#### **Shirts and Hats**
