

## **Engine Timing Follow-up**

The past TWO MONTH'S we ran the article on 'Model A Ignition Timing' by Marco Tahtaras. The article is one that most anyone can follow, and thus we all should be able to time our engines.

Now I have a question for all of you out-there, that read the timing article! Why do we time the engine in our 'Model A', in the first place?

As the distributor spins, the points open and close. As they **open**, the coil fires and is directed to the correct cylinder, by the way of the Distributor Cap (Bat Wing). The Timing of that fire is very important, because the air and gas mixture in the cylinder needs to be under pressure, for the best burn. If the fire gets there too soon, the engine tries to **buck**. If it gets there too late, you do not have any **power**. In actuality it should fire just before the piston gets to the end of compression stroke, thus momentum carries the piston on around, giving you a good power stroke.

So with this in mind, how important is Ignition Timing? Very Important! Timing tells the spark plug when to fire!

Those who have driven the Model A for some time know how to use the spark lever on the left. You want to climb a hill, you retard the lever; you want better mileage you advance the lever, right? If you become good at advancing or retarding you can account for a timing error, up to a point. If you forget to advance or retard it will affect your performance.





Plate lever notch in distributor body must not be altered.

The spark lever must also be adjusted to the correct position for the best operation and engine performance. As mentioned in **Marco's** article, additional tips #3, you may twist the column tube of a Gemmer 2 tooth steering column to get full travel on your spark advance lever. The slot on the Distributor Cap is supposed to give you 20 degrees of travel. After making sure you have that 20 degree window, then adjust the column tube to get that full travel.

Some have bent the spark control rod to shorten the travel. Some have cut the rod and added a coupling. These attempts are not necessary if you take your time and set it up right in the first place. I assure you, Henry didn't approve of altering the length of the rod. Yes, I know we may be dealing with Repo Parts... sooo...take your time, and you can do it.

Now for some general information on timing. When the points are closed (which is called Dewell) they ground the primary side of the induction coil (a soft iron core) which completes the circuit back to the battery. By this completed circuit, electric energy is induced into the secondary coil, by magnetic induction, increasing the voltage to around 20,000 volts. This voltage is high enough to jump the air gap of .035" set in the spark plugs.

When you set the gap on your points at .020" this allows the coil to discharge when the points open, and also allows the coil to recharge fully when points close again. All within 90 degrees rotation of the Distributor – open – discharge – close – charge – for each time the piston comes to the top of the cylinder, on the compression stroke.



When all this happens at the correct time, your Model A will run as Henry wanted it to!


In comparison, modern cars do not need ignition timing (per se) because they are computer controlled. In modern engines you have basic timing set within wide parameters. There are numerous sensors that tell the computer what the engine is doing, and the computer tells the coil when to fire the spark plug!!

## **Model "A" Fashions**

Farmer work clothes are the focus of this month's fashion article. Nothing was more basic than overalls, a shirt, chore jacket (in cooler weather) and boots. I have some pictures of these items in this month's fashion article.







The overalls really have not changed much since 1930. Many now have though. zipper, **Zippers** were invented in 1933. The ad to the left shows a zipper so it was after 1933. It was common

for farmers to wear Henley shirts. If it was warm, they probably didn't wear a shirt. The chore jacket was simple and made from a heavy fabric like denim, duck, etc.

This year for Christmas, I gave Ray a pair of overalls and a cotton Henley shirt. I was able to find both at Smith & Davis Clothing, located between Peachtree City and Fayetteville, on Highway 54. If you are interested in competing in fashion awards, they wouldn't be acceptable. If you want to wear them when driving your "A", it could be a lot of fun and a great conversation starter. I found chore jackets on line. There were many choices and manufacturers.

## Meet the Southside A's

## **Phil & Kathie Meyers**

Phil and Kathie were born and raised in Southern California, Phil in Anaheim and Kathie in Costa Mesa. The way they met was serendipitous. In Phil's words, "Our first brief meeting was at a night club on the top floor of the Grand Hotel across the street from Disneyland in September, 1966." Phil was there to listen to his friend's group play some new sounds, and Kathie was there with some friends.

The second unplanned meeting was at a car show in Long Beach where they reencountered each other admiring the same car! Twenty-one days later they were married in Las Vegas. Phil was emphatic, "This girl was not going to get away!"

Phil's interest in mechanical objects began at age ten when he took apart a clock and became fascinated with the workings. His postal-worker father couldn't have helped put the clock together again, not being technically inclined, but Phil remembers fondly, "What was important was that my parents were supportive in whatever endeavor I chose. My dad knew how to turn on the key (to the car), but that was about it."

Those were the days of The Beach Boys, James Dean, Elvis, Jan and Dean, Dick Dale and the Deltones, the Righteous Brothers, the surfing craze, cruising, drag races and the cool California lifestyle. In essence, both Phil and Kathie were immersed in the culture of "American Graffiti."

Before their marriage, Kathie drove an Austin Healey Sprite and Phil a new Plymouth Savoy Belvedere with a surprise high performance 383 motor. A month later, they traded the Plymouth for a "spankin' new 1967 Camaro RS-SS 350 4 speed, one of the first delivered in California." Three months after that Phil was drag racing in the C-modified production class at the hallowed Lyons Drag Strip in Long Beach, CA, towed there by a '57 Nomad purchased for \$1,200. In 1973, while running at the Drag News Nationals, Phil suffered a major breakdown in the final round of competition, costing them their transmission, the rear end and the driveshaft. This incident spelled the end of drag racing for this young family.

Phil worked in the grocery business from high school until the end of the sixties. He began as a box boy and by age 22 was an assistant manager of a supermarket chain. After this, he went into consumer product sales. In 1975, he was promoted to a regional sales manager position in the south and relocated the family to Georgia. Since that time, neither Phil nor Kathie has ever looked back.

During the California years, Kathie worked as both a real estate escrow and trustee sale officer for a mortgage company. Once settled in Georgia, she worked as a real estate paralegal for about 4 years. Then, for a 5-year period, she designed fabric-related crafts (quilting, doll making, crochet) and wrote instruction books for a California publisher, after an initial self-published book. She then went into a 20-year career as a real estate paralegal and retired in 2002.

Phil and Kathie's first born, Jeff, came along in January, 1971, and their daughter, Dana, in October of 1973. Both are graduates of Georgia Southern. Jeff works as a sales manager for Hospitality Mints, and Dana is an assistant principal at a Cobb Co. middle school. Jeff and Jenny have nine-year old Maddie, who happens to like touring in Model A's. Dana and Matt have two-year old Kinsey, and a baby boy due out of the oven late April! The Meyers' are a tight-knit family and can be found on most Sundays at the Dogwood Baptist Church.

In 1998, their friend Jack Miller loaned Phil and Kathie an incredible Simplex to drive in their first Social Security Run. "IT WAS AWESOME AND WE WERE INSTANTLY HOOKED!" Shortly after, they purchased a 1930 Briggs Towne Sedan, proceeded with restoration, and since have driven "Hazel Rae" about 16,000 miles around town and on tours. Last year, in a tribute to their nostalgic past, Phil and Kathie purchased a classic, thorn-brown Model A roadster (street rod) with a '51 Ford flathead engine.

a "Model A Checkup Sheet" and reviewed many subjects regarding maintenance and




trouble-shooting for the upcoming touring season. His insights are invaluable and appreciated by all.

### St. Patrick's Day Corn Beef & Cabbage

1 corned beef brisket

1 large head cabbage (preferably Savoy)

8 peppercorns

6 cloves garlic, whole peeled

4-5 parsnips

1-2 turnips

2 bay leaves

1 pound carrots, peeled

6 large potatoes

1 stalk celery, thinly sliced

3 – 8 whole cloves (depending on your taste)

1/2 tsp Old Bay seasoning

1/4 tsp black pepper, ground



Wash brisket. Make small X slits in the meat and insert garlic and cloves pieces.

Place the meat into a stockpot (at least 8 quarts). Cover the meat with water. Add bay leaves, peppercorns, Old Bay, 2 carrots and sliced celery. Bring to a boil, skim off foam and reduce heat to a simmer. Simmer 3-4 hours, or until meat is nearly tender.

Meanwhile, prepare vegetables. Quarter the cabbage, peel potatoes, carrots, turnips and parsnips. Slice vegetables into 2-inch chunks.

During the last hour, add remaining vegetables and cook until tender.

Drain and serve with brown grainy mustard.

It was a wonderful experience for all.







Following lunch we head slightly south to the Jarrell Plantation on the outskirts of the Oconee National Forest. After a stop at the historic plantation, our trail takes us through the Forest towards Milledgeville, hopefully allowing time to see some of the sights in Milledgeville such as the **Old Governor's Mansion** and the museum district. Plans are to overnight Friday and Saturday in Milledgeville.

Saturday we head Northeast towards Washington, Georgia, a historic city with the **Robert Toombs Home** and the **Callaway Plantation**. The drive will skirt Lake Sinclair, taking in the rolling hills flowing into plains of the farming country. We hope to also have a tour of a private WWII museum with airplanes and cars.

If the WWII museum does not work out, the route would change, heading first to Eatonton for a stop to visit Brer Rabbit and friends at the Uncle Remus museum and then head towards Washington.

Accommodations are reserved at **Comfort Suites**, 2621 North Columbia Rd., Milledgeville, Georgia. The room block is under "Southside A's." 


