

s the 6th Annual Sweet Home Alabama Tour becomes a memory, I can only say the memories are sweet, very sweet indeed. Huntsville, Alabama, known as "Rocket City," had very much to offer and what a great tour it was! David and Caroline Miller did an incredible job! Along with Dick and Jane Halderman, David and Caroline had the tour running like clock work, or at least like a Model A.

Most folks arrived at the Holiday Inn Express on Thursday. Thursday evening we had a fabulous barbeque dinner at the Helion Masonic Lodge in the historic district of Huntsville which was only a few blocks from our host hotel. David is a Master Mason at this lodge. After dinner we got a very interesting tour of the historic Lodge building. This lodge was formed in 1811. Helion Lodge is also the birthplace of Freemasonry in Alabama.

Friday morning came early due to the many events planned. The drivers meeting was held in the parking lot at 6:45 a.m. By 7:00 we were on our way! Our first stop was Burton Marsh's farm. What a huge collection of steam engines, steam powered boats, steam powered equipment, Stanley Steamer cars, washing machine engines, and mechanical gizmos. Mr. Marsh told us he'd been collecting for 87 years and believe me, it

shows. The farm is not normally open to the public so it was a rare treat.

Our next stop was Pulaski, Tennessee. A quaint town just over the border, Pulaski retains its old southern "charm." The downtown area essentially looks like it did back in the Model A days. We had a Southern fried chicken lunch at the historic STAAR Theater and Opera House. We toured the Opera House upstairs after lunch. One of the most interesting tidbits we learned is why opera houses were typically in the second story of a building - simply because, in the days of dirt streets, it kept the dust out of the opera house. The



STAAR is a 503c3 tax deducible foundation and they have a long road to complete restoration but the entire town seems very enthusiastic and we believe they will get there, hopefully soon. An encouraging aspect is how many children in town have become involved in acting, singing and dancing in this historic landmark.

We also visited Sharp Ford in while in Pulaski. This dealership is still operating and owned by the Sharp family. It opened for business in 1930. That date ring a bell? The original Ford neon signs throughout the dealership were spectacular. The sites of charming Pulaski were many and varied so if you ever get the opportunity, we suggest a stop there is in order.

We moved on, with a police escort I might add, to an Amish cheese store and gift shop. From the line at the cash register I think we made a fairly healthy dent in the their inventory. My personal favorite was the lemon/chess square. Actually, it was "squares" in my case!

On the way to the dinner stop, our tour took us down a road that can only be described as a *real* "Model A road." What a great place for our old cars. The leaves had started to turn and it was absolutely beautiful. The cherry on the cake for this off-the-beaten-path road is that it went under an original Civil War era railroad bridge. The sound of camera shutters was deafening as well as the "awooga" noises bellowing from its interior!


Our dinner that night was at the famous Greenbrier restaurant. The Greenbrier has been a Huntsville institution for many years. Fresh cat fish and smoked BBQ was delicious and always a hit with Model A-ers.

We toured back to our host hotel and a good night's sleep. I didn't speak to anyone who had trouble falling asleep that night because we had plenty of pleasant memories for some sweet dreams.

Saturday was a shorter tour day after Friday's 153 miles! We got to sleep in a bit since the Drivers' Meeting was at 7:45 a.m. that morning! Paul Majerick told me I should have been downstairs at 4:30 AM for

At 8 o'clock we were off to the US Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville. This should definitely be on everyone's bucket list. It was a self guided tour and there was so much to take in, one could spend days there and not see it all.

After the riveting rocket visit, we went to the Veterans' Museum. This museum is quite a humbling experience. I think everyone came away with a greater sense of pride in our military. The museum covers our military from inception to present day.

Back to the host hotel for some down time before our Farewell Banquet. Like everything else on this tour, the Banquet meal was far above your average meal. After dinner we were serenaded by James Smith "The Autoharp Man". The autoharp is a bit like a regular harp but held in the arms of the musician. The autoharp is a standard for the old time Appalachian music which is Jim's specialty. Jim was accompanied by his 6 year old grand-daughter on harmonica.

After the concert, names were drawn and door prizes given out. I've never seen so many door prizes at one tour in my life! The prizes were all useful items as well. Nobody left empty handed.



The Tech Corner

Model "A" Q & A


"My wife slammed the door, and the window cracked. Now what?"



First of all, for the sake of all that is harmonious, do not blame it on your wife! There really is no reason the glass should have cracked just because the door was closed. Look down inside the door, and see if you see a screw, or piece of metal that may have come in contact with the glass. With some detective work, you should be able to find out what caused the problem. Be sure to repair the problem before replacing the glass, or it will break again.

Remove the glass from the door very carefully, wearing leather gloves. Usually there is some trim to be removed to allow the glass to be taken out. Any glass shop should be able to copy the glass to the correct dimensions. <u>Be careful about finding dimensions on the internet, they are usually wrong.</u>

When the new glass is ready, 3 edges will be polished. Be sure to put the unpolished edge down into the bottom of the door. Use glass bedding tape to hold the glass in the lower channel. Do not use JB Weld, or other epoxy. The Glass bedding will hold it fine. When everything is reassembled, test it by rolling it up and down. Then... take your wife out for a nice meal.



Enjoy the Drive...

"I want to have my Model A Coupe painted. Where do you get the original paint?"

Model A's were originally painted with Lacquer paint, which is no longer used in body shops. Today's products are far superior to the original finishes used in 1930. Get yourself a copy of the Model A Ford Paint and Finish Guide (PN# A91910B) This has tons of information, along with accurate paint color chips for all years and body styles. You can pick out the colors you like, that are appropriate for your year and body style, then take the paint chips to your local paint supplier and have them mix up everything you need. Word of warning: you might be surprised how much paint costs these days, usually about \$200 per gallon.

The editors received this late-breaking tech tip from our occasional mystery contributor:

Recently, reading some old Model A books, I found an alternate solution for starters with 12V conversions. On your "A" Starter you can use **Ford Part**#480400 starter drive. This is used on Ford, Caterpillar, Case and Massey Ferguson Tractors.

I have in the past helped to fish out Bendix bolt pieces in the bell housing of an "A" with 12V; it's not a fun day even if you are successful. In one case we ended up pulling the engine. The New **A11350M** Bendix may also be an adequate solution, however, this part requires a special tool to install.
