


The group filled up four tables, ate to our heart's content, then migrated out to the cars for some milling about and sharing with onlookers.

Red-hot Safety!

It was brought to my attention, after last month's article, that Sir Isaac Newton would not be very happy since I gave credit for his law "*what's in motion tends to stay in motion*", to Einstein. I was commenting on Murphy's Law, got it wrong - just another example of Murphy's Law, right?

Have you ever been there? Everything going just right, *and then...* well.

I just heard about a situation, where 'what could go wrong' did. On an outing to the Hiawasse area, 7 or 8 years ago, there were maybe 80 or so Model 'A's' parked in and around the Pine trees; beautiful setting, right? The kind of area we would like to go to. Well, as a couple of men were working on Ray Besch's car, one saw 'SMOKE' coming from another car real close by. By the time these men got to the other car, flames were coming out around the dash. They opened the hood, started pulling wires, while another tried to get the Dash Panel loose. The flames died out and happily no MAJOR damage. Seems the Amp Meter shorted to ground, direct short, the wire heated up which caught the fabric insulation on fire. The flames were **too** close to the gas cap, which you know is vented; why it did not go BOOM they do not know, but it didn't.

One man had an Amp Meter, another 'this' and another 'that;' within 45 minutes the car was started and ran good enough for Dick Carne to drive his Phaeton home.

This brought about 2 things, maybe three. One, a friendship started, two, the idea of keeping extra parts and supplies with you! (Usually it's easier to fix our cars than to try to get them towed home.) And third, **where was the Fire Extinguisher??**

I understand some of the car clubs require you to have an Extinguisher with you, on any group outings. Soooo... do you have one in your car? Do you know how to use it? How fast can you get to it?



The National Fire Prevention Association rates Extinguishers in two ways, the first a 'Letter' rating, A, B, C, D and K, next a 'Numerical' rating. The higher the number the more fire fighting power.


Class 'A' - Normal combustibles, paper, wood, cardboard and most plastics. Numerical rating indicates the amount of water it holds and the amount of fire it can extinguish.

Class 'B' - Liquids such as gasoline, kerosene, grease & oils. Numerical rating equals approximately number of square feet of fire it can extinguish.

Class 'C' - Electrical equipment, appliances, wiring, circuit breakers, etc., this unit is non-conductive. No Numerical rating.

Class 'D' - Combustible metals, such as Magnesium, Titanium, Potassium, and Sodium. Only for Class 'D' fires, **NOT** for Multi-purpose ratings. No Numerical rating.

Class 'K' - Kitchen fires, cooking oils or Trans-fat oil, such as deep fryers. No Numerical rating.



Some fires may involve a combination of these classifications. Our Fire Extinguishers should have an 'ABC' rating. This is a multipurpose dry chemical Extinguisher. It is filled with Monoammonium Phosphate, a yellow powder that leaves a sticky residue (better than losing our cars) OR a 'BC' rated extinguisher, a dry chemical, which is filled with sodium bicarbonate or potassium bicarbonate (corrosive residue), which must be cleaned immediately to prevent any further damage to our cars.

What size of Extinguisher suits your car? Weight determines the size of a Fire Extinguisher. A 2-pound Extinguisher is light enough to handle easily and small enough to fit into our cars. A Commercial Vehicle must carry a Fire Extinguisher, usually around 5 pounds.

Our cars need an Extinguisher that will handle, Gasoline, Grease, Oil, Wiring, Electrical, Upholstery and yes, Wood and Cardboard. So a Dry Powder, 'ABC' or 'BC' is what we need to

carry, in **each** of our cars. Including our Modern rides. I carry a 3- pound unit in both my 'A' and my Modern cars.

If you have an Extinguisher, when was the last time you checked it? Yours has a gauge on it right? Well, how do you know it is still good? If it has been there for some time, tap on the gauge. Is the needle still in the green scale? Now take the Extinguisher, turn it upside down, right next to your ear. Do you hear a swooshing sound? Yes? Then it is still good and can be used. If you hear a thump, the chemical has turned solid and will not work, even though you're in the green.

Don't wait until you need your Extinguisher to read how to use your Extinguisher; then it may be too late!

Last but not least, you need to get to it very quickly. Where do you keep yours? Mine is right behind the driver's seat!

Vintage Day @ the Peachstate Aerodrome



September 16-17-18, 2011



Pinstriping Your Tires

Have you ever debated whether to put white walls on your Model A, or stick with Henry Ford's standard blackwall tires? It can be an agonizing experience, with esthetic and financial considerations. Well, there might be an alternative to consider, a distinctive touch that might be a fun "in-between" to your white wall vs. black wall dilemma.

Before I talk about this treatment, a little background is in order. Last year's MARC convention in Indiana highlighted a plethora of great cars and great detailing. In particular, I was enthralled with the preparation for the fine point judging. In fact, I spent the better part of one day watching maestro Jim Brand not only applying last minute pinstriping to some of these competitors, but also applying a little-known tire treatment on several of the cars lined up for his services. What led me to seek out Mr. Brand was my studying of cars behind the stanchions in the hotel anteroom to the conference center where onlookers were able to have up-close experience with some unbelievable steel. There was a reproduction of the famous Buehrig Model A painted in glorious Capucine (reddish yellow), a beautiful restored Fordor, an original fire truck, and a custom extended Fordor. But the vehicle that struck me the most was Rex Cole's blue '31 Deluxe Panel Truck (featured in the SSA's Volume 4, #1 "Photo of the Month").

Not only was it a rare model, obviously beautifully restored, but I couldn't take my eyes off the tires. And I wasn't the only one to notice as I saw several others pointing to the wheels and clicking their cameras.



These tires were subtle, but classy, and distinctively different than the normal 19 or 21 inch blackwalls encountered on Model A's. Finally, during my 2nd trip to gaze on this Henry Ford beauty, it dawned on me that the groove below the distinctive diamond treads had a thin silver pinstripe that I hadn't recognized.

Jim Brand enlightened me with an article by tire guru, Enrique Klein, in "The Restorer" July/Aug 1997, entitled "On Authenticity, Tires - A Summary," which includes several interesting quotes about not only the silver pinstripe on the late 1930 and '31 Goodyear tires, but also notes about the red centering pinstripe guides on the Firestone and Goodyear brands which can be seen just above the edge of the rim when the tire is mounted. The Klein article also describes the waving flag logo on the later Goodyear tires which included a "yellow upper and lower fields with blue side fields over a stippled background" (see photo) as well as photographs of original tires with the red and silver pinstripes.




To back up the research even further, Jim Brand produced a period photo of National Park Service pickup trucks lined up in the street outside a Washington Ford dealership, all with clearly brand new Goodyear tires with silver pinstripes and painted flags.


