




MARC NATIONAL TOUR - CHATTANOOGA, TN



The Tech Corner

Following the National Meets this summer, a truck, trailer and Model A were taken from the Ford Museum parking lot in Detroit. The editors were discussing this event over ice cream recently and were introduced to a clever, and important, piece of information for identifying one's Model A in the event of its ever being stolen. Now, as you know, Model A's in many cases are cookie cutter cars and difficult to distinguish side by side. Engine numbers can be changed easily as well as other unique items. So, if you find yourself in a similar situation, and are lucky enough to have the police find the car, how do you prove it's yours?

Here is something we all should do with our collector car(s): devise a simple I.D. tag, make two or three copies, and hide them somewhere in your car. Good locations would be behind a door panel, inside the door, on the top of a frame rail, etc. Use your name and address, possibly including a number, like a PIN, to set it apart. Keep a copy of the tag somewhere safe, should you ever need it. We also heard of dropping your business card into the door after rolling down the window. But laminate it first so it has some "shelf life."

Here's an example of how this technique has worked in the real world: a street rod was spotted at a Pawn Shop, that turned out to be a locally stolen car. When the authorities were notified by the owner, he advised them to remove a panel and look for his I.D. tag. This they did, thus proving ownership, and he regained possession of his car.

Good ideas for further protecting our precious "ladies."

Ray at <u>besch105@comcast.net</u> to get your name on the list. More details to be sent out as we approach the date.





Meet the Southside A's

Ray and Teri Besch



If you've ever seen Ray and Teri during the Christmas season, they are an unmistakable pair...Ray with his flowing white beard and magisterial robes dressed as Santa, and Teri artfully playing his elf. But in the world of Model A's, they are equally well known for their contributions to our club over many years, as well as their generosity in helping others get their Model A's on the road, particularly after tour breakdowns.

But, as they say, there is more to the story so we will start at the beginning. Ray was born in South Bend, Indiana, (home of the Fighting Irish!), three years after the close of WWII, and 45 years after

Henry Ford's first 2-cylinder car was produced. A new devotee had entered the world.

Teri was born in Niles, Michigan, (the year that Bobby Thompson hit the homerun, "The Shot Heard Round the World," against the Dodger's Ralph Branca, crushing the dreams of this writer who was 9 years old at the time). Ray's parents had relocated to Niles, setting the couple up for a future meeting. In fact, Ray said that the two of them "actually...sort of grew up together. We were married as kids," with most of their memorable experiences having been enjoyed together.


So, was Ray's father handy with tools? "In our home a handyman was never called." Obviously, Ray was an apt pupil of his dad's, starting with construction on such early projects as roofing the family home at age 8

following a hail storm, and assisting on an addition to their home at age 12. A few years later he even helped to convert both his parent's and grandparent's furnaces from oil and coal to natural gas.

Cars were always a passion, and Ray assisted his father with repairs were to the family car, all done outdoors, without a garage



shelter...and, Ray reminds us, "Michigan was cold." His first



exposure to a Model A, as a teenager, was seeing a 28/29 Model A Coupe on the last stop of his paper route - a used car lot. It was brush painted but looked pretty good; asking price was \$50. Ray pled his case to his mother to buy the car, but was met with an emphatic, "No way." Much to Ray's chagrin, the edict held.

As it turned out, Ray's father had two Model A's in earlier years, both roadsters. He and Ray's mom had courted in them around

Michigan. And Ray discovered one of the reasons for his mom's adamant answer... Ray's father had taken apart one of the A's and the parts were scattered all over the family's yard.

After high school graduation, Ray joined the US Army from 1968-70. Upon Teri's high school graduation in June, 1969, they were married in Niles on one of Ray's three-day passes from Fort Knox, KY. Teri

turned 18 two weeks later.

Following the army tenure, Ray and Teri relocated to Harrisonburg, VA, following Ray's employer, Kawneer, an architectural aluminum company, to a new facility/division. His lifelong interest in technical drawings was put to good use during his 41-year career, holding various sales and management positions.

Teri worked in the business world on and off for about 10 years before deciding to follow her dream to be a teacher. She complete her Bachelor of Science degree, followed by a Masters, and she just celebrated her 26th year as an elementary school teacher.

Although Teri won't be found pulling an engine or lubing the undercarriage, her love of the car hobby (Model A and otherwise) is just as great as Ray's. And she's driven all of them, even as daily drivers. The family stable has included three '37 Dodge Business Coupes (Teri bought the first one as a 22nd birthday present for Ray), a '56 Ford, '53 Studebaker, '76 Corvette Stingray, and so on; and, of course, their 1930 Model A Coupe, seen here before its restoration:







Ray and Teri's two children - daughter, Kris, and son, John - grew up with the fun of the many family cars. They were each given a rebuilt vehicle upon reaching driving age, participating in their reconstruction and maintenance. John is a diehard gear-head and is immersed in the car world even more, if possible, than Ray.

The Southside A's came into being largely through Ray's efforts. He and Teri were among the initial members that grew out of the "Griffin A's." The loose-knit club, which included the Carnes, Papes, and Willinghams, wanted to expand, and so re-formed under the name "The Southside A's." Ray became the first

president in 2004 and served in that position for three years. The fledgling club soon included the Millers and the Johnstons, among others. Ray also launched the newsletter which chronicled the club's events and provided cohesiveness to the venture. The club was on its way.

Always intrepid travelers, the Besch's exemplify Ray's philosophy of driving your Model A's anywhere, since, "they can take it." And they proved that with their 11,000-mile trek to Alaska and the North Pole in 2011. More trips are always beckoning, including a possible coast-to-coast run.



"The Forsaken" by Tim Tzouliadis

The Henry Ford/Joseph Stalin Partnership

(After purchasing our A400, and discovering that it had a Russian-made Model A engine, my research took me to a recently published book that tells the story of the building of the Ford factory outside Moscow in 1932, and the Americans who made the journey to work there on the assembly line. Many people are unaware that this factory even existed, let alone that Americans worked in it. As a fascinating, and moving, history related to our hobby, I thought it would be of interest to share a review of this thought provoking book.)



There exist many myths in regard to the curious collaboration between the famed American Capitalist, Henry Ford, and Joseph Stalin, which some called "Henry Ford's parallel universe." But its result was the GAZ automobile plant near Nizhni Novgorod, Russia, and was manned by thousands of Americans who went to Russia during the height of the Depression, some out of a naïve embrace of socialism, but all seeking paying jobs.

Many believe that Ford was never paid for founding the "Soviet Detroit," and was angry about the entire enterprise. But the overall result was that the he was able to off-load his antiquated Model A machinery and sell 75,000 cars to the Russian government...all of it paid for in gold. That the gold was mined by slave labor was a fact Ford was unaware of.

In Tim Tzouliadis's recent book about this era, "*The Forsaken*," he describes how Henry Ford's palpable hatred of labor unions and Communism had to be politely ignored, while at the same time, Ford ironically was revered in Russia as a secular, socialist saint who gave the automobile to the common man. Of course,

the underlying reason for this unlikely alliance was that Ford needed money, and the Russians needed cars; Ford, "held the keys to a mechanical heaven." The cover of the book shows a completed Model A Phaeton coming off the Gorky production line under a massive Stalin banner.

Regardless of the motivations of the Ford/Soviet enterprise, or the dreadfully mistaken characterizations of Ford himself, the sad result concerned the fates of the two thousand or more American engineers and skilled auto workers, some with their families, who had enthusiastically moved to the Soviet Union to work at the GAZ as part of the original contract, bringing with them American baseball, jazz and a powerful work ethic. They fell into two distinct groups: those who were enamored of the Russian socialist experiment; and those who desperately needed work when jobs were scarce in the U.S.

Tzouliadis's book is an in-depth study, against the backdrop of the factory, of how these Americans became caught up in the events leading up to Joseph Stalin's Great Terror that occurred between 1936 to 1938, and beyond. Much has been learned about The Terror, and the subsequent bloody years until Stalin's death in 1953, as a result of the collapse of the Soviet empire, Glasnost and the partial release of KGB, NKVD, and other secret police documents. This information reveals much about Stalin's bizarre and savage fear of Western influence.



After getting the assembly line into production, and living, working and raising their families, their lives intersected with the tide that was turning in Stalin's worldview. A visit to the American Embassy, seeking help or a trip back home, only made one a target And so, these hapless people, stripped of their American passports, were soon sentenced to the gulag slave labor camps where certain death awaited within a few short months; were executed in the Lubyanka prison or other killing spots; or burned in the Moscow crematoriums. All together, mass graves situated throughout Russia and Siberia contained the remains of an astonishing 15-30

million souls, far in excess of Adolph Hitler's unbridled brutality. The difference was that the allied forces liberated Hitler's death camps and recorded the horror; while having a camera in the Siberian wilderness amidst the camps was a certain death sentence. In Russia, there were no Western liberators. Very few Americans returned after the Terror began in full force.

The unrepentant Bolshevik, Vyacheslav Molotov, for whom the factory was named and the Model A and B engines were dedicated, was Stalin's functionary-in-chief, who had an iron revolutionary will, and signed the death warrants of millions. In an act of self-preservation, when Molotov's wife was imprisoned on espionage charges, Molotov wrote a letter to Stalin stating he was in favor of the action.

In the face of Stalin's unrelenting, lethal wrath, that periodically eliminated his henchmen and those closest to him, Molotov miraculously survived, as did his wife. After Stalin's death in 1953, Mrs. Molotov was released and returned to live with her husband in the dacha settlement of Zhukovka. Molotov died there at the age of 96.

The final, tragic irony was that many of these terrified workers, taken in the night by NKVD police, were transported in the very Model A Fords that they had so enthusiastically helped to build at the Gorky factory.

This will be a "Hub Tour" conducted from Huntsville, Alabama with the headquarters at the Holiday Inn.

The tour will kick off with a welcome "home style" dinner Thursday evening, 6:00 p.m. at the Helion Masonic Lodge for some tire kicking, renewing of old friendships, and great southern dining. The scenic tour will start Friday morning in Huntsville, AL with a tour of the Burton Collection with its antique automobiles, tractors, engine collection and many other historical items. Then we're off on a road tour through the countryside to historic Pulaski, Tennessee. Our visit will include a stop at the Trail of Tears Memorial, a tour of the local Ford Dealer's museum, and lunch on the town square at the historic STAAR Theater. After lunch we will visit the local antique & flee mall, "Ole Time" hardware store, drug store for some ice cream at the soda fountain, and then on to shop at a small local Amish Store. On our return trip to Huntsville we will pass under a one-lane Civil War Era Railroad Bridge, stopping at the Greenbrier Restaurant in Huntsville for dinner. After dinner we will return to the Holiday Inn.

Saturday's activities will feature a visit to the U.S. Space and Rocket Center (Rocketcenter. Com), which has the largest collection of rockets in the world, an IMAX theater, thrilling rides, and actual vehicles & artifacts from U.S. and Russian Space Programs. Afterwards, we will tour the Veteran's Memorial Museum, which displays over 30 historical military vehicles from WWI to the present, as well as artifacts and other memorabilia dating back to the Revolutionary War.

The festivities continue Saturday evening with a farewell dinner, at the Holiday Inn and the "Famous Huntsville Buffet." Sunday morning we're off for home and the end of another adventure on the Model "A" Highway.
